Cinema: Reflecting Own Image

Going through another run-ofthe-mill romantic drama "ekk deewana tha (2012)" didn't give much to think about in first go. Visiting it repeatedly for its music provided an encounter with a sequence of lesser known song "dost hai". A songsequence representing a particular pattern of narrative, which is there in the whole film. Sequence is about our male protagonist (Prateik) pursuing female counterpart (Amy) to accept his love for her. It is taking place in various spaces, which does not seems to be inter connected on surface. Even a very clear distinction appears by seeing what Siegfried Kracauer said about different tendencies in

In Theory of Film, he argues that cinema has two distinct

tendencies, i.e. realistic tendency and formative tendency. As he explains further, the realistic tendency expands upon the realism of photography through its incorporation of movement and staging. In initial days, films of realistic tendency only featured narratives as it is within a frame and provide movement only in case if object moves. This objective movement differs from his explanation of subjective movement in which camera movements and editing techniques came into play. Subjective movement move the audience through the space. By this application cinema went closer to its recreation of reality. Kracauer also includes the factor of staging, which is to create or built an artificial setting of location but to convey the impression of actuality

only. He connects this tendency

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
Nurturing Minds: Unveiling the Pivotal Role of Teachers' in Shaping Student Development

In the intricate tapestry of education, teachers emerge as the master weavers, skillfully crafting the future through the nurturing of young minds. Beyond the transmission of knowledge, their role extends into the realm of shaping students' development. Indian society occupies a place of pride of its own in the world which includes in it's & scope various religions, communities, languages & cultures. It continued to engulf streams of various cultures in it like a vast ocean.

Education reflects the total life of a society. In this society, the backbone is our students. The teacher as a mentor influences the lives of his learners to such a deep level that his role is just like a sun to give light of holistic development of the future generation - the leader who are to become the tucker bearers. Swami Dayanand Ji has rightly stated that the baby starts his/her education in the womb of a mother. This education i.e., the survival for life is further impaled by the ones known as teachers.

Acc to Bogoslovsky "The student is a finite person growing when properly education, under the control of a Guru who is a friend, philosopher & guide. They need such education which is imparting in-depth knowledge, redeem their aspiration and guide their path towards perfection. The right guru/teacher is an institution in himself.

It's rightly said that a real teacher occupies a place of pride & honor us imparting education. The mistake of an engineer is gets sunk in the foundation of a building, the mistake of a doctor is burned in the grave but if a teacher is not able to impart true education then it reflects in the life of entire nation.

with Lumière brothers' cinema in his argument.

So there are locations in the sequence, where our characters live in the narrative space of film. These spaces are giving impression of today's life in an urban setup. Nothing seems to be alien as far as comparison with actual life is concerned. So partially the sequence falling into realistic tendency.

While talking about formative tendency, Kracauer exemplifies Méliès who instead reproducing physical reality, went on to penetrate the realms of fantasy. In further explanation he says that movie directors have at all times rendered dreams or visions with the aid of setting which are anything but realistic.

In sequence, majorly characters are seen around the locations, which are visibly constructed spaces to create a spectacle. The use of bridge with a large backdrop of the moon is the example of that and also signaling towards the obvious elements used to fantasize romance in cinema over the years. These parts are pretty much close the category of formative tendency, where according to Kracauer film maker goes on to fulfill formative aspirations on the expanse of realistic tendency.

This whole setting provides a sense of sequence being partially a dream song sequence. But is the space is decisive enough to reach a conclusion? The behavior of the characters becomes as important as space here. Behavior of the characters in these given spaces not letting these spaces be what they visually seems to be.

On one side, Amy is going to office, shown displeased with Prateik the way she does in real space of film. On the other hand, Prateik elevating to Amy's balcony spreading his arms (very cinematic idea of romance) in slow motion in real space of the film. This contradictory behavior prevails throughout the sequence.

This intermingling of spaces



becomes interesting and ambiguous at the same time, whether it is a dream sequence entirely or dream with the traces of reality. There comes the last part of the sequence, where film maker provides a quick rationality. Our protagonist (Prateik), who is an aspiring filmmaker in narrative of the film shown working on film sets. The large backdrops of moon, monuments are getting changed and replaced. These are the same formative spaces where our characters are shown moving around. So the very physical reality (Kracauer's concept of filming life as it is) of Prateik's professional front becomes an indicator of his personal front in narrative of the film. So all the spaces turn into real ones with relation to narrative.

The sequence somehow becomes portrayal of formative tendencies of cinema through realistic tendency. This seems very close to what Kracauer states about cinematic approach with these tendencies, i.e. everything depends on the right balance between the realistic tendency and the formative tendency; and the two tendencies are well balanced if the later does not try to overwhelm the former but eventually follows its lead.

The whole scenario generates the curiosity about the perspective with which the sequence has been created. There are two earlier counter parts of this sequence in its Tamil (vinnaithaandi varuvaaya) and Telugu (ye maaya chesave) versions by the same filmmaker i.e. Gautam Menon. What is interesting in comparing it with Hindi version is again the behavior of characters.

It is not bleeding into other space. Characters are dancing around the formative setting and behaving usual in real space as they do in film. Where in Hindi, switching spaces does not lead to fragment one space to another. Amy continuing with what her character thinks and behave like in film. On the other hand Prateik imitating the perception of cinema behavior irrespective of spaces. This provides a kind of continuity to spectator in terms of association with narrative and characters.

It indicates towards how cinema has changed and also trained its spectator over the years. The shock aesthetic (with which cinema initially tricked viewer to this attraction) is no more relevant enough to be the only factor for cinema goer. Also the capacity to engulf unconsciously and still connect to the basic sense out of imagery is a development. The iconic images related to a particular emotion has become so prominent through cinema that one does not need to tell what does large moon signifies and so on.

At the end of the song comes a dialogue from Prateik, i.e. at least talk to me, I'm singing for you from one month. This does not signify just the narrative time which is consumed in the sequence but also the effect of cinema on character itself. That's how the whole sequence becomes a self-reflexive exercise of cinema, which is either very much aware of its own medium or may be imitating its perception of own self.

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
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IITM Group of Institutions organised One-Day Workshop for Faculty on 'Happiness Through Theatre'


